



Dendi in Niger

In the 16th century, the Songhai Empire ruled in West Africa, and the Dendi people can be traced back to these origins. The Dendi people live in West African countries such as Togo, Benin, Nigeria, and Niger. While the Dendi were traditionally traders, they are currently known as maize, millet, and plantain farmers. They also raise cattle, camels, sheep, goats, and chickens. The Dendi are almost all Muslim. The New Testament has been translated into Dendi, but the vast majority have never had the opportunity to hear the gospel.

Ministry Obstacles

It is difficult for ambassadors of Christ to share the gospel in Niger. There are hardly any believers among the Dendi.

Outreach Ideas

While it is difficult to reach the Dendi people, many of Jesus' parables speak into the lives of farmers and shepherds. Pray that these stories would connect with the hearts and minds of the Dendi.
