The Malayo have a democratic way of governing. Every few weeks, the men gather at night to discuss and vote on the various issues their tribe faces. Village shamans act as leaders and are in charge of carrying out the decisions.

Ministry Obstacles

The Malayo suffer from extreme poverty. Child malnutrition is a major problem. In addition, the Malayo are struggling to keep their land from encroachment of Spanish-speaking settlers. Education among the Malayo is almost non-existent.

Outreach Ideas

Linguists are currently developing an alphabet for the Malayo language. An alphabet could lead to a ministry of teaching God's truth from the Bible.

A tiny fraction of the Malayo are believers. Pray that they would grow in the faith and be bold in sharing the
